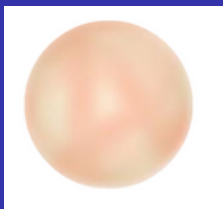

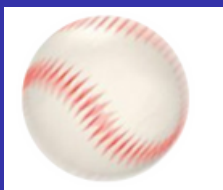

Fastball: The tighter the spin, the darker the ball



Slider: A red dot at two o'clock.



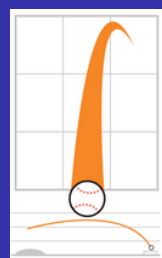
Curveball: Lighter pinkish shade. The only pitch to seemingly POP out of the pitcher's hand after release.



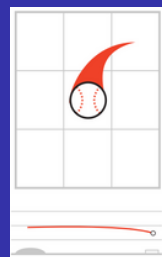
Changeup: Lightest shade with the slowest spin rate.



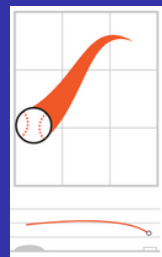
Two Seam: Downward spin rate will make the seams look like blurred vertical railroad tracks.



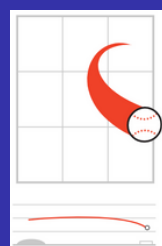
Fastball: A good fastball will explode out of the hand. Pitchers who throw 93+ mph can pitch effectively up in the zone to induce lazy fly balls.



Slider: The slider typically breaks toward the pitcher's glove side. The Slider from a right-handed pitcher tends to move down and away from a right-handed hitter.



Curveball : A good curveball will have a bugs bunny loop 12-6 drop. (Think: clock with hands at 12 and 6). Lastly, a "beginner's curveball" may have the index finger up and off the ball.



Changeup: A good changeup from a right-handed pitcher will have a 1-7 type movement and will look as if it drops off of a table.
